

Food Bank



Leominster Food Bank is moving again - hopefully for the last time! Over the past year the demand for the services of the Food Bank has grown tremendously. For example, in May 2019, 94 people were supported whereas in May 2020 that number rose to 531. As well as the change to pre-packed bags the range of support has also grown. For instance, food bags were offered to all school pupils during school holidays when this wasn't provided by the Central Government. Due to grants received, families who are home-schooling children have also been able

to receive support with heating costs. The support that the Food Bank receives from individuals and organisations has been amazing.

The Food Share is a new venture making use of fresh and packaged food that supermarkets and local shops cannot sell. This food is able to be offered to all and has proved particularly helpful to families who have lost their second income because of the pandemic and are therefore struggling to make ends meet. It also avoids food waste as this food would otherwise have gone to landfill. Food Share means that we never have to turn people away from the Food Bank because they don't have a voucher.



All this has meant that the premises in the Community Centre car park have not been able to store all the food. At one point six storage facilities were in use. We have had a temporary distribution unit at Hinton Terrace for the last six months but now everything can be in one place as the Council are renting us part of the Old Priory building, opposite the Youth Hostel. This means that there is a storage room, Food Bank room and Food Share room as well as a kitchen and toilet facilities. All our sessions will happen there from 27th February. Barnabas Fund - Myanmar

A chilling Myanmar Army document has been discovered instructing soldiers to "punish and breakdown" ethnic-minority Christians and other civilians deemed to be against the military regime. The discovery came in the same week that mass protests took place in Myanmar (Burma) over the recent military coup, with a ramping up of armed patrols in Karen and Kachin States reported. There are many Christians amongst both the Karen and the Kachin ethnic groups. The official document lists a sequence of actions that military personnel should take including firing a 12mm weapon (equivalent to a powerful machine gun) at individuals or using a 38mm weapon (a gun capable of launching grenades) on groups of civilians. The directives include special instructions to round up any dissenting civilian doctors and nurses and to report on any local leaders who are not fully cooperating with the military.

Christian leaders in the region requested prayer for the people of Myanmar and for a "change of heart" of army and coup leaders. "Please pray for the Karen people hiding in the jungle," they asked. Thousands of Christian villagers fled military bombardment in Karen State to take refuge in remote jungle on 1 February, the same day as the Myanmar leader, Aung San Suu Kyi, and her democratically elected government were ousted in the military coup. Since December 2020, the military have increased ceasefire violations in Karen State, shelling villages in order to clear land for new roads and military installations.

For decades, the military-controlled government of Myanmar brutally oppressed mainly-Christian ethnic people groups including Karen, Kachin and Chin, as well as the mainly-Muslim Rohingya people which includes a small minority of Christians. Even during the transition to civilian democratic rule, a process which began in 2011, violence against the ethnic minorities continued.

Pray for the protection of all Christians and other civilians at risk in Myanmar. Ask that persecuted Christian families taking refuge in the jungle will be kept safe in the shelter of the Most High (Psalm 91:1) and that their practical needs will be met. Call on the LORD to incline the hearts of army and coup leaders towards compassion and lead them to a personal encounter with the Prince of Peace.

Vennture



When the name of Vennture is mentioned, I would think that most of you would associate it with Street Pastors or Family Pastors. Due to Covid there has been considerably less happening in the 'night-time economy' during the last year, so therefore less need for Street Pastors.

Family Pastors have been keen to support families whose problems have probably been even greater than previously but, with the necessity for social distancing, home visits cannot take place. So, the support is being delivered in a different but permitted way. Each volunteer Family Pastor, all from different churches around the county, now has a specific family to pray for and bring before our loving heavenly Father. Link workers continue to make some visits, otherwise contact is made by telephone.

The Building Better Opportunities project team, through link workers, continues to help individuals rebuild their lives, supporting them with, for instance, battles against addictions and issues with temporary accommodation. Working alongside them is the Housed Homeless team which helps people to find permanent accommodation as well as sourcing vital furniture and equipment for their new home. Often homelessness goes hand in hand with domestic abuse and debt. Link workers are able to signpost towards debt counselling and give advice and support to help people back into work. Each step forward may be small but in the right direction.

The Ambassador team has increased once again with some of our Lean on Me volunteers helping out. The aim is to have two teams out in Hereford every day and it is once again looking positive. Vennture also has a Winter Provision team working from St Peter's which is working closely with the Ambassadors. They are able to reach out to rough sleepers, provide them with short term solutions such as a warm coat for the night whilst endeavouring to find them better places to lay their heads. *Polly*

Yorkshire Camps update

Hello friends! Here's another update letter after a couple of months. At the start of January everyone performed a mad rush back up to the hall to get here before the new lockdown kicked in so we are all safely back at Netherside, happily Covid free. It has been pretty cold and snowy the last month and a hot water bottle has become an essential! One of the first things we did was to create some memory verse videos that hopefully we will be able to use on future camps. It has been just as useful to us as hopefully it will be to them, and we very much enjoyed doing them. My group managed to fit Romans 12:12 (ESV) to Livin' on a Prayer by Bon Jovi. I'll let you look that up and see if you can sing it. We also spent that week starting to work on a video that intends to show off Netherside Hall to supporters, and I will certainly include a link to that at some point when it has been finished.

Despite the new lockdown, we have been ploughing ahead with all sorts of things. The Wednesday Zoom bible studies have continued and they seem to be going really well. Dan has given me the opportunity to do the talk for one of those coming up, so I'm getting excited for that. In these studies there is always a point when we go into Zoom breakout rooms to have a discussion about the talk with the kids to talk about what they've just heard. We're mixing up the groups a bit more now, so whereas before Christmas I would always run the boys' breakout room with Dan, now I'm in the breakout room with different kids and different leaders. I think this has been really nice to be able to work with some more of the kids and hear what they all have to say. Sometimes they can be quite quiet when you try to interact with them but more and more often I'm finding that we can have good discussions and they are becoming more confident to answer questions.

The Leyland ministry course is still on Zoom and we have been continuing to receive excellent teaching from the likes of Mark Pickles and Steve Casey. This month I gave a talk on the parable of the persistent widow from the gospel of Luke. In March my passage is from Judges chapters 4 and 5 where Deborah and Barak lead Israel.

This week starting 13th Feb was very exciting because it was half term for most people and we ran a whole host of Zoom camps all week. We prepared games, activities and question times with

great enthusiasm and we had to get our heads around Zoom in order to run breakout rooms and work on the tech side of the camps. Many of the camps have packages sent out to the campers full of books, games and treats that we used on the camps. There was also one live streamed to Facebook and YouTube on Tuesday the 14th aimed at year 3s to year 6s. I'm so happy that we are able to run camps this way and that so many people have shown interest. It just goes to show

that God still has ways of working, even when they're not what you expect.

In our free time we have continued to be adventurous and have walked to places such as Rylstone Cross.It's a great blessing that churches are allowed to be open despite the lockdown and I have been very much enjoying Alan Marsden's preaching at Martin Top. So in general it has been a very lovely and enjoyable start to the year with many more things to come!

Prayer Points: We are looking for training team members for next year, so pray for more applications. If you know anyone who might be interested do give them a shout. Pray for the team, that we all continue to grow in the Lord and with each other. Thank God for his provision and the way he is using Yorkshire Camps.

Activities this month have included the Spectrum children making Egg-heads and the Sunbeams children decorating animal masks.










During Lent our families are counting down to Easter with a calendar. Each day there is part of a story to read and a corresponding sticker. *Hannah*
